Everson, WA 98247 Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20)

These are the words that end Matthew's Gospel and in many ways these verses encompass the mission of the church in every age. But what is it that Jesus has commanded us, his followers, to do? Perhaps the beginning and the end would be Jesus' response to the question posed to him earlier in Matthew,

"Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" (Matthew 22:36)

³⁷[Jesus] said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' ³⁸ This is the greatest and first commandment. ³⁹ And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' ⁴⁰ On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." (Matthew 22:37-40)

Jesus tells us that all the law and the prophets point to love of God and love of neighbor. Simple right? If it were only so easy. Before we are even out of the gate we quickly realize we so often fail to love God above all things. Hopefully, this would forever drive us to our knees in repentance, but it doesn't, for we forever find some way to rationalize, to justify, to convince ourselves we have done this, and then all is lost.

However, all is not lost, because our Good Shepherd has a heart for the lost and is faithful to the faithless. What a freedom does this give us? You mean God's love and faithfulness is not dependent upon our response? God's faithfulness to us is not dependent upon our faithfulness to God? Yes, that is it, God's love and faithfulness and life is ours, no matter what.

It is out of and in this freedom that we live and breath and have our being. It is out of and in this freedom that we can actually chance to love our neighbor as ourself, to truly love and care for them as Christ would.

It is in and out of this freedom we consider the problems of our brothers and sisters experiencing homelessness. It is in and out of this freedom we consider how we are to welcome the other. It is in and out of this freedom that we consider how we are to, "Love our enemies and pray for those who persecute you," (Matthew 5:44). But even more than merely considering these things, we are called to actually do them, to love our neighbors as ourselves.

INTERFAITH COALITION NEWS

"Do small things with great love..." It really DOES make a difference! Interfaith Coalition has many small ways you can help those in need: knit hats and scarves for Project Warm Up: volunteer once a month to help serve and transport food for the CAST program, or collect items that CAST distributes year round (gloves. hats, small size hygiene items, socks, tarps.) Call Interfaith at 734-3983 for more info. In addition, Interfaith collects items for Project Homeless Connect, a one-day event in Bellingham on July 22 that brings immediate access to services for the homeless. Giveaway items needed: travel-sized hygiene items, new socks and underwear (adults and children), blankets, sleeping bags, tarps, tents, backpacks, shoes (tennis shoes and boots only), baby wipes, flashlights and batteries. (NO CLOTHING PLEASE!) Donated items can be brought to the Interfaith office at St. James before July 15 – *please call first*. To volunteer at the event, contact the Whatcom Volunteer Center at 734-3055.

CAST (Coffee and Sandwiches Together), a street food outreach program, serves over 750 meals each month, 4 evenings a week, and is totally volunteer-run and donation-supported.

- Consider "adopting" a food item to regularly add to our supplies: from peanut butter to hot cocoa packets, helping provide food items helps greatly. (CAST has a very specific list of food items, so please contact us before collecting.) All year long CAST also needs your donations of new, unopened: socks, travel-sized lotions, conditioner, shampoo, toothpaste, razors, and toothbrushes.
- CAST needs volunteers. A once-ortwice-a month 2 hour commitment doesn't put a huge dent in your free time, but has huge results: many people won't go to a cold bed under a bridge also hungry those nights.
- Ask congregation members if they
 would consider sacrificing a cup of
 coffee once a week and donating the
 price. One small latte would pay for two
 meals. A small sacrifice, but a
 meaningful way to help someone.



Bishop's Message

When Strangers Become Friends

There is a golden thread that has been woven through my life. It is the thread that moves me from being a person who is usually frightened and uncomfortable to a person who is blessed with new friendship.

I can tell you countless stories beginning with my childhood family. My father worked for the Easter Seal Society which is a non-profit advocating and providing services for people with incredible physical and mental challenges. It was my dad's habit to invite the people he was working with to our home. Imagine how my eyes lit up as a little boy when Harold Wilke, a man with no arms, was able to sit at the dinner table and use his feet as effectively as I use my hands. This once strange man became a highly respected family friend.

I remember in High School participating in a week long exchange program with Cleveland High School. We are talking about my nearly all white high school visiting a very integrated city school. It began with a parent orientation where the anxiety was off the charts. It took the parents from Cleveland to correct the many misperceptions and fears that the suburban parents held. I was so fortunate to have been selected as one the students to participate in the exchange. Yes, I was afraid and it would take weeks for the fear to turn into another great blessing in my life. Not to mention I developed a crush on a Chinese girl whose parents would not allow me to talk to her on the phone. Moving to my internship year in Bellevue, I discovered the opportunity to take a group of High School kids to a group home in Renton where the residents were children who were mostly bed confined and with no speech skills. This was not only challenging for me but a brand new experience for most of the kids in the youth group. When I run into these kids who are now adults they often comment about how significant this ministry was.

Fear has often been a show stopper in my life and every time I give into it my life becomes constrained and limited. This is not to say fear doesn't have its rightful place. One of our daughters had a scary encounter with a large dog when she was quite little and developed a real fear of dogs. When we discussed this with our pediatrician she said, "She should be afraid of dogs. It will help protect her until she learns the necessary judgment skills to know when it's ok to engage a dog." It is a lesson I have not forgotten.

I am still trying to learn to honor the rightful place for fear in my life without letting it trump the golden thread of blessing that comes when I learn to welcome the stranger.

Friends, this has been one of the great gifts of serving the office of bishop. It continues to afford me the opportunity to be in the presence of people who first appear to me as strangers, often creating discomfort but almost always ending up as being gifts in my life.

It should come as no surprise that one of the most repeated admonishments in scripture is, "Do not be afraid!" Fear that surprises us with blessing is one more expression of God's grace.
