Dear People of Immanuel,

This past week after leaving a visit in Ferndale I was treated to a somewhat rare delight, a Cooper's hawk flew across a barren field and perched upon a telephone pole. Cooper's hawks are not rare, but to see one perched up, rather than flying 90 miles per hour in and out of trees is special. I was reminded of a bike ride I did last fall, with an Abbotsford friend. As we rode the flats just over the border, I noticed a large Bald Eagle nest with two birds nearby, just as a group of crows flew between trees, and to my surprise, there was a Cooper's hawk frolicking amongst that murder of crows. Then a Merlin, A MERLIN, that had been perched on a wire took flight. All of these sightings, mind you, occurring seemingly at once. Oh, and there was a Red-tail also in the mix, so 4 raptors, in the span of 10 seconds. I had to stop riding, simply amazed, and reflect on what I just saw.

Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. (Matthew 6:26)

This section of Matthew which is titled, "Do not worry" begins:

Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? (Matthew 6:25)

And ends:

So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today." (Matthew 6:34)

OOOOFFF. "Today's trouble is enough for today." How can we be told not to worry? This scripture is honest, telling us we will have troubles and trials and tribulations, and incredibly condemning, for how can we not get caught up in the worries and troubles, not just of today, but also tomorrow?

Doesn't this finally go back to the roots of our problems, our inability to love and trust God above all things? That constant and persistent drive and desire for us to wrest control of our lives and our futures from almighty God, and because we can't we worry and fret. While we writhe and struggle our good and gracious God continues to provide for us.

Jesus came that we may have life, and have it abundantly, and that life is born out of the truth that nothing, not even our worry and mistrust, can ever separate us from God's love.

Bishop's Message

Companionship

What is it about eating together that draws people into deeper relationship? It is true for meals of romance, friendship and even business. Sitting across the table, face to face, enjoying good food and beverage has its own magic. It works whether you start out as complete strangers or you are lifelong friends. Meal is part of the glue that holds friendships together.

When I traveled to Ethiopia I learned how important sharing a meal is the world around. The villagers that we visited spent the entire day - from before sunrise until dinner - working on behalf of the meal. It began with the women walking for miles to find sticks for the fire. The younger women were sent out to get clean water. Then there was the preparation of the "tef" which is what they call the grain our of which they make their bread. It was back breaking work to grow which the men did on the hills that they first had to terrace with rocks. Tef has to be separated and pounded and sifted before it can be cooked. Goat meat was an added treat. The young boys of the village raised the goats by tending to them all day long. A life spent preparing for daily meal made the words of the Lord's Prayer come to life, "Give us this day our daily bread."

It was such an honor and a joy to be the guest knowing full well that we were receiving a portion of the meal that they themselves were sacrificing. Meal is how we honor guest the world around. It is how we build lasting friendship.

The English "companion", the Spanish "compañero", the Italian "compagno", and the French "copain" all come from the Latin meaning "with whom one eats bread."

It is no wonder that the Bible is filled with meal

stories, breaking bread, sharing fish, feasting, celebrating and huddling around fires.

This past year many of us in the Synod who are a part of the Living Local movement have been dwelling in the story of the, "Sending of the Seventy." In the story Jesus encourages the seventy, on more than one occasion, to enter the home of strangers and to eat whatever is set before them. This is what radical hospitality is about. It is one thing to set table for another. It is something else to sit as guest and to receive what is offered.

Living Local is a movement within our Synod that is based upon an accompaniment model. Accompaniment is how we discover God together with our neighbors by breaking bread with them. We have living examples of where this is happening through block parties, barbecues, in-home meals and often at place like Luther's Table.

It is one of the hoped for outcomes of our Neighbors in Faith movement – breaking bread together with our Muslim and Jewish neighbors.

Jesus was on to something on the night in which he was betrayed, when he took bread and broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat. This is my body given for you."

Friends, companions, I continue to believe at my deepest level that this is precisely what the world is hungering for – Companionship!
